Students at Center McMechen Elementary School, Glen Dale Elementary School, and

John Marshall High School hosted Mr. Mensah for a week-long residency. Sowah has taught music in both Ghana and Nigeria and is currently a music

professor at both Macalester College and the University of St. Thomas in St. Paul, Minnesota. General music teacher Kathleen Fox and John Marshall High School band director Tracey Filben coordinated to bring Marshall County. Sowah to "Educators must engage students in opportunities that allow them to think creatively. Exposure to diverse sights, sounds, experiences, thoughts, and cultural differences will provide new perspectives that enhance creative thinking" explained Fox. Therapeutic Services Program



Beginning the Fall of 2012, Marshall County Schools will be offering training in Therapeutic Services for Marshall County students seeking certification as a Certified Nursing Assistant or ECG Technician. This program continues the effort of the Marshall County School System to meet the career goals of all students while also working with employers to meet the growing demand for employees in the health care field.

Currently, this program is being developed by the office of Career and Technical Education of Marshall County Schools in cooperation with the West Virginia Department of Education's office of Career and Technical Education. Instruction will be provided by a registered nurse with experience in long term care employed by Marshall County Schools. Classes will meet at John Marshall High School for approximately two periods per day for juniors. Seniors will meet three periods per day which will include a significant number of work based hours. Upon graduation, the student will be eligible for employment as a Certified Nursing Assistant or ECG Technician. Students may also wish to continue their education to receive their degree as a registered nurse or in another health related field. Miner Training

Marshall County Schools will be offering apprentice miner training for graduating high school seniors in cooperation with the West Virginia University Mining Extension Program. This eighty hour course will provide training to allow the student to receive their apprentice mining card and be eligible to apply for positions in local underground mines. Instruction will be provided by John



Tuba and Steve Perkins of the WVU Mine Extension Training Program. Both instructors have been teaching for several years following more than thirty years working in underground mines. Marshall County Schools will continue to work to meet the career goals of all of their students while also working with employers to meet their needs for quality, trained employees.

Classes will meet Monday through Friday, June 11 to June 25, from 8 am to 4 pm in Room 210 at John Marshall High School. Students must be 2012 high school graduates and will be required to provide their own transportation and lunch. To apply, students must complete a brief application. The application deadline is Friday, June 1, and the class is limited to the first twenty-five applicants. Adopt-A-Backpack Campaign


